Please <u>stand</u> when the bell rings, for the procession of the clergy and servers, and to sing hymn 355:


A reading from the book of Numbers. (Numbers 11; 25-29). The Lord came down in the Cloud. He spoke with Moses, but took some of the spirit that was on him and put it on the seventy elders. When the spirit came on them they prophesied, but not again.

Two men had stayed back in the camp; one was called Eldad and the other Medad. The spirit came down on them; though they had not gone to the Tent, their names were enrolled among the rest. These began to prophesy in the camp. The young man ran to tell this to Moses, 'Look,' he said 'Eldad and Medad are prophesying in the camp.' Then said Joshua the son of Nun, who had served Moses from his youth, 'My Lord Moses, stop them!' Moses answered him, 'Are you jealous on my account? Remain seated for the second reading:

Reader A reading from the letter of St James. (James 5; 1-6)

An answer for the rich. Start crying, weep for the miseries that are coming to you. Your wealth is all rotting, your clothes are all eaten up by moths. All your gold and your silver are corroding away, and the same corrosion will be your own sentence, and eat into your body. It was a

burning fire that you stored up as your treasure for the last days. Labourers mowed your fields, and you cheated them – listen to the wages that you kept back, calling out; realise that the cries of the reapers have reached the ears of the Lord of hosts. On earth you have had a life of comfort and luxury; in the time of slaughter you went on eating to your heart's content. It was you who condemned the innocent and killed them; they offered you no resistance.

This is the word of the Lord.

After a moment of silent reflection, stand for the gospel acclamation:

Deacon A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark. (Mark 9;

38-43, 45, 47-48.)

People Glory to you, O Lord.

Deacon John said to Jesus, 'Master, we saw a man who is not one

of us casting out devils in your name; and because he was not one of us we tried to stop him.' But Jesus said, 'You must not stop him: no one who works a miracle in my name is likely to speak evil of me. Anyone who is not against us is

for us.

'If anyone gives you a cup of water to drink just because you belong to Christ, then I tell you solemnly, he will most certainly not lose his reward. 'But anyone who is an obstacle to bring down one of these little ones who have faith, would be better thrown into the sea with a great millstone round his neck. And if your hand should cause you to sin, cut it off; it is better for you to enter into life crippled, than to have two hands and go to hell, into the fire that cannot be put out. And if your foot should cause you to sin, cut it off; it is better for you to enter into life lame, than to have two feet and be thrown into hell. And if your eye should cause you to sin, tear it out; it is better for you to enter into the kingdom of God with one eye, than to have two eyes and be thrown into hell where their worm does not die nor their fire go out.' This is the Gospel of the Lord.

All <u>stand</u> to say the Nicene Creed:

I believe in one God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible.

I believe in one Lord Jesus Christ, the Only Begotten Son of God, born of the Father before all ages. God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, consubstantial with the Father, through him all things were made. For us men and for our salvation he came down from heaven, and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate, he suffered death and was buried, and rose again on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures. He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He

will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. I believe in one holy, catholic and apostolic Church. I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Please <u>sit</u>, as the Choir sing the anthem "The Heavens are Telling" by Franz Joseph Haydn, while bread and wine are brought to the altar.

<u>Stand</u> to sing hymn 358, as the altar is prepared and the collection is taken. If you want to give by card, there is a card reader at the back of church.

Please <u>kneel</u>. The Eucharistic Prayer continues, until the Words of Institution.

Then all make the Memorial Acclamation:

Deacon Great is the mystery of faith.

People Save us, Saviour of the world, for by your cross and

resurrection you have set us free.

The Priest concludes the Eucharistic Prayer, and all sing:

People Amen!

Please <u>stand</u> for the Lord's Prayer.

Priest At the Saviour's command, and formed by divine

teaching, we dare to sing,

People Our Father, who art in heaven

hallowed be thy name,

thy kingdom come, thy will be done;

on earth as it is in heaven.

Give us this day our daily bread.

And forgive us our trespasses

as we forgive those who trespass against us.

And lead us not into temptation;

but deliver us from evil.

Priest Deliver us, Lord, we pray, from every evil, graciously grant

peace in our day, that by the help of your mercy, we may be always free from sin and safe from all distress, as we await the blessed hope and the coming of our Saviour

Jesus Christ.

Priest The earth is replete with the fruits of your work, O Lord;

you bring forth bread from the earth, and wine to cheer

the heart.

The people come forward to receive Communion. If you have not been baptized and confirmed, please come forward for a blessing instead of Communion, carrying this order of service.

During Communion hymn 378 is sung, all remaining seated or kneeling.

Then <u>stand</u> for the blessing and dismissal

Priest The Lord be with you.

People And also with you.

Priest And may the blessing of almighty God, the Father, and the

Son, ★ and the Holy Spirit, come down on you and

remain with you for ever.

People Amen.

Deacon Go in peace, glorifying the Lord by your life.

People Thanks be to God.

The clergy and servers go to the shrine of Our Lady for the Angelus:

Priest The angel of the Lord brought tidings to Mary,

People And she conceived by the Holy Spirit.

Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee; blessed art

thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus. Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death. Amen.

Priest Behold the handmaid of the Lord,

People Be it unto me according to thy word. Hail Mary...

Priest And the word was made flesh,
