This booklet contains all the material you will need for today's celebration of Mass. We hope that you will find this service easy to follow, but please do not be afraid to ask if you are unsure what to do at any point. The building is fitted with an induction loop and you will find the best results away from the pillars.

Families with small children are very welcome to make use of the carpeted play area at the back of church, where you will find books, crayons and soft toys. There is a further play station in the north aisle. Older children should join Children's Church, who will go out to the Hall after the first hymn, and return in time for Communion.

A toilet is at the back of church, behind the screen. After Mass, please join us in the hall for refreshments. Before Mass, please try to maintain an atmosphere of quiet prayer.

Mass setting: Congress Mass.

Please stand when the bell rings, for the procession of the clergy and servers, with Scout flag parties, and to sing hymn 533:

Now sit to listen to the first reading:

Reader A reading from the book of the prophet Ezekiel. (Ezekiel 47; 1-2, 8-9, 12).

In those days: The angel brought me back to the door of the Temple, and behold, water was issuing from below the threshold of the Temple towards the east (for the Temple faced east). The water was flowing down from below the south end of the threshold of the Temple, south of the altar. Then he brought me out by way of the north gate and led me round on the outside to the outer gate that faces towards the east; and behold, the water was trickling out on the south side.

And he said to me, 'This water flows towards the eastern region and goes down into the Arabah, and enters the sea; when the water flows into the sea, the water will become fresh. And wherever the river goes, every living creature that swarms will live, and there will be very many fish. For this water goes there, that the waters of

the sea may become fresh; so everything will live where the river goes. And on the banks, on both sides of the river, there will grow all kinds of trees for food. Their leaves will not wither, nor their fruit fail, but they will bear fresh fruit every month, because the water for them flows from the sanctuary. Their fruit will be for food, and their leaves for healing.'

Corinthians. (1 Corinthians 3; 9-11, 16-17)

Let each one take care how he builds upon it. For no one can lay a foundation other than that which is laid, which is Jesus Christ.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John (John 2; 13-

The Passover of the Jews was at hand, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem. In the Temple he found those who were selling oxen and sheep and pigeons, and the moneychangers sitting there. And making a whip of cords, he drove them all out of the Temple, with the sheep and oxen. And he poured out the coins of the money-changers and overturned their tables. And he told those who sold the pigeons, 'Take these things away; do not make my Father's house a house of trade.' His disciples remembered that it was written, 'Zeal for your house will consume me.'

So the Jews said to him, 'What sign do you show us for doing these things?' Jesus answered them, 'Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up.' The Jews then said, 'It has taken forty-six years to build this Temple, and will you raise it up in three days?' But he was speaking about the temple of his body. When therefore he was raised from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this, and they believed the Scripture and the word that Jesus had spoken.

Please remain standing for the Act of Remembrance, and turn to face the War Memorial. The priest goes to the War Memorial, and is joined by Cllr Kira Gabbert, who carries the wreath:

Priest

Let us remember before God, and commend to his safekeeping, those who have died for their country in war: those whom we knew, and whose memory we treasure: and all who have lived and died in the service of the peoples of the world.

They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old; age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning, we will remember them.

People We will remember them.

Cllr Gabbert lays the wreath below the Memorial, and all observe the two minutes' silence. At the end of the silence:

Priest Rest eternal grant unto them, O Lord.

People And let light perpetual shine upon them.

Priest Ever-living God, we remember those whom you have

gathered from the storm of war into the peace of your presence: may the same peace calm our fears, bring

justice to all peoples and to establish harmony among the

nations; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

People Amen.

The priest and Cllr Gabbert return to their places. Please turn to the front and remain standing for the Prayers of Intercession.

The Priest introduces and concludes the prayers.

Priest Let us pray to God, the only giver of peace to the Church

and to the world.

Reader Lord, in your mercy,

People Hear our prayer.

At the prayer for the departed,

Reader Rest eternal grant unto them, O Lord.

People and let light perpetual shine upon them.

When the prayers of the saints are asked,

Hail, Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee. Blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus: Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death. Amen.

In conclusion to the prayers:

Please sit, as the Choir sing the Kontakion of the Departed, to the Kyiv Melody, and bread and wine are brought to the altar.

Stand to sing hymn 456, as the altar is prepared and the collection is taken. If you want to give by card, there is a card reader at the back of church.

Please kneel. The Eucharistic Prayer continues, until the Words of Institution. Then all make the Memorial Acclamation:

Priest The mystery of faith.

People Save us, Saviour of the world, for by your cross and resurrection you have set us free.

The Priest concludes the Eucharistic Prayer, and all sing:

People Amen! Amen! Amen!

Please stand for the Lord's Prayer.

Priest At the Saviour's command, and formed by divine

teaching, we dare to pray,

People Our Father, who art in heaven

hallowed be thy name,

thy kingdom come, thy will be done;

on earth as it is in heaven.

Give us this day our daily bread.

And forgive us our trespasses

as we forgive those who trespass against us.

And lead us not into temptation;

but deliver us from evil.

Deliver us, Lord, we pray, from every evil, graciously grant peace in our day, that by the help of your mercy, we may be always free from sin and safe from all distress, as we await the blessed hope and the coming of our Saviour Jesus Christ.

The people come forward to receive Communion. If you have not been baptized and confirmed, please come forward for a blessing instead of Communion, carrying this order of service.

During Communion hymn 401 is sung, all remaining seated or kneeling.
